#### FROM THE MINISTER



#### Dear friends,

We're newly back from an exotic holiday in Morocco. It was a tour around a large part of the country, with a lot of the time in a bus, but it meant we saw Casablanca, Rabat, Tangier, Fes, Ouarzazate and Marrakech, Now I hadn't heard of the fifth in that list either (though it

turned out to be a very popular place for making films nowadays), but it was there also because it fitted in with heading out to a (luxury) tent on the edge of the Sahara, to see glorious sand dunes at sunset and at sunrise...

Anyway, aside from holiday memories, Morocco is a largely Islamic country, so one hears the daily calls to prayer, since Muslims are expected to pray five times daily. And there are various other rules – on food, on charitable giving and on other matters – which equally regularly are observed.

It set me thinking again on how we regularly discipline ourselves as Christians. What are our daily routines for prayer? How do we measure out what we will share of riches or blessings we enjoy? And remembering how Jesus taught on the subject of food and it mattering above all perhaps not so much what we take in as what we put out – how to love in action therefore matters very much – do we keep a strong line on that?

At the beginning of February a storm blew up around the comments of the new Vice President of the USA, who had said that love of those nearest us (in family) was more important than any other love, such as love for the rest of the world; and that this was the Christian way. Many have rushed to the parable of the Good Samaritan or the Old Testament teachings about the foreigner in their protest that J.D. Vance was wrong. As I understand it, he could be wrong but not altogether wrong. How so? Well, Jesus of course famously taught that our neighbour, the one closest to us, may well be someone we ordinarily would have no common course with; that neighbour might even have treated you as an enemy. That is the parable of the Good Samaritan. Jesus also taught that attachment to family may not always be the most important issue - "Who is my mother, and who are my brothers?" (Matthew 12:46). Jesus' leading point, however, was that our first love, our first love, should be for God, and once we are in love with God, God's love will lead us. God's love, as someone has written wisely, is not like a cake needing to be divided up. A cake has limited

portions! Rather think of love being a fire which will warm anything with which it comes into contact. And so love goes out even towards the enemy, goes out towards even the one who does not reciprocate. And it also of course, and rightly, goes out towards those we are closest to, our best friends, and our family. (With them indeed, most of us learn how beautiful love is!)

I hope this is helpful. The fact of course is that love is frequently challenging – whether within a family *or* amongst strangers! We all need to practise it, to become better at it. And that takes me back to this discipline of being a Christian. A discipline is something you apply yourself to, that you give energy and time to. Prayer five times a day? Carefully thought out ways of giving to others, rather than just now and again and when we feel like it? And a spirit of love? As I explored the internet debates all around J.D. Vance, I found this interesting quotation by the Danish philosopher Soren Kierkegaard: "The task is not to find something loveable, but to find whatever has been given to you or chosen by you, loveable, and to be able to continue finding them loveable, no matter how they change."

So there's the thought. Politicians wage their battles, but we in the church, we are to learn how more to love God, and how more to love one another. To practice that.

#### Cairnlea 2020

Maybe I spoke too soon last month, it is certainly continuing to be very cold, but as ever it gets lighter each day there is evidence of snowdrops, crocus and daffodils in our gardens. Members of our team have started the work by tackling some of the outdoor jobs as the weather permits.

#### 1. Electricity Supply.

The Electricity meters saga continues without resolution. We have recently changed energy suppliers to E-ON, we shall have discussions with them to find out if they have a solution.

We shall keep you informed.

#### 2. Cash Flow.

Bank Balance as at 17.02.2025 is £ 95,629.93

No outstanding Invoices.

#### 3. Fund Raising.

Following discussions with Historic Environment Scotland (HES) we are applying to the small grants scheme for the roofing project. This process is expected to take up to three months till HES give us a decision.

#### 4. 2020 Phase 4 Future Plans.

NLC inform us that our project for funding has been submitted to the National Regeneration Capital Grant Fund (RCGF) and a decision is possible

within the next three months. We would ask you to continue in prayer for a successful outcome for this funding.

The updated details of Phase 4 have been shared with the General Trustees and the Presbytery Property Group during our meeting with them this month.

Please ask any member of the group should you have a question or idea relating to Phase 4.

#### 5. Roof Project.

All the necessary approvals are in place and the work is being scheduled to align with the receipt of funding grants. NO CHANGE

#### 6. Marketing.

Helpfully we are receiving many bookings for the use of our premises with an increasing number coming from NLC and other local charity groups. Please spread the word to those you meet or groups you may visit, that there is a growing range of groups, meetings and caring events going on within our buildings throughout the week. Encourage people to come for fellowship, friendship and to share their faith with others who may come along.

#### 7. Alarms - Security & Fire

DMI our Alarm Supplier is arranging a date for Alarm Fob training.

#### 8. Tower Storm Damage

We have submitted our costs to the COS Insurance company to handle the claim, and we

expect a full recovery of the funds already spent.

As we await a decision about the next major step for our building development, we give grateful thanks to our Lord for His insight, support and leading of our congregation and our 2020 group. We continue to give thanks to God for your sacrificial giving and your prayers of encouragement to us all.

#### **From Finance Committee**

Hopefully by the time you read this article the first signs of Spring are beginning to appear.

The Finance Group had its first meeting of the year on 3<sup>rd</sup> February. We had a very full agenda. Among the items discussed were:-

The provisional end of the year Income & Expenditure figures, The budget for this year, Utilities (Gas and Electricity –trying to negotiate agreements with service providers), Property –Church & Manse and discussions on our ongoing insurance claims for storm damage etc., Cairnlea -2020 -a report on projects and their financial position.

In an effort to agree a timetable for the completion of our Audit and production of our Final Accounts, the Treasurer & Drew Reekie met with our auditors –Messrs Benson Woods. A report on this meeting was given and the feeling was that both parties felt that it had been very worthwhile.

The other thing I want to mention is that the audit of our Organisations Accounts is scheduled to take place on 20<sup>th</sup> February.

As promised in my last article I want to give you some figures from the provisional year end Income & Expenditure Accounts. Can I stress that these are subject to change from such things as accruals, & bills due to be paid for work carried out during 2024. It will at least give you some insight of how the Church did financially during last year.

Just a brief comment: - Collections were down approx. £1,000 while the charge for the Use of our Premises continues to show good growth.

Just a couple of comments on our expenditure: With regard to Repairs etc there is an Insurance Claim lodged for the damage to the Church Tower. This will reduce the figure. With regard to the salaries figure I have ignored the salary paid for our Building Supervisor as we are very fortunate indeed to receive donations which offsets his salary.

Let me stress again that these are provisional figures only. Once the Church accounts are finalised then they will be made available, as usual, for members of the congregation to examine and ask questions. A date for the Stated Annual Meeting has still to be set and this will be advised in due course. I would urge all members of the congregation to attend this, if at all possible, in order that you get a full insight into Church Finances and have an opportunity to ask questions.



Theexits: A condition where the sufferer rushes for the exit before the minister gets there.


Church Meeting Paralysis: This can strike suddenly, when a post in the church needs filling. A good dose of enthusiasm works wonders with this sad affliction.

# THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT

Galations 5:22,23

The nine fruits of the Spirit are Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self-Control. We don't strive for the fruits of the Spirit, rather we plant ourselves in good soil, allow ourselves to be fed by the Holy Spirit, keep taking in nourishment, turn to face the light of Christ and these fruits will develop and grow in our lives.

Can you tell whether a tree is an apple tree or a pear tree? Not easily when they are in blossom, but very easily when they bear fruit. Bearing fruit takes time and a lot of planting, preparation, nurture and growth.

March is the time of year when gardeners begin to plant seeds ready for summer, but patience is needed – the seeds will take a while to germinate, and the gardener needs to write the names of seeds on labels and not forget which are fruit, flowers and vegetables. The seeds need to be in the dark, or the light, or the warmth or the cool, depending at what stage of life they are at.

So too, is God with us. God writes our names on His heart; God knows what fruit we can bring forth. God nurtures us and gives us light to grow. But first, we need to be planted and that can be scary.

Maybe you are feeling in a cold dark place this March, maybe it feels as if you've been buried, maybe you've got a weight above you and you can't see the way out. Just think that maybe you've been buried because you've been planted.

With patience there will be warmth and light, be like a seed, trust God, and begin to grow out of the darkness towards God's marvellous light. We won't see fruit immediately; we have to be nourished and mature and ripen. Patience will be given to us, fruit of the seed of the Holy Spirit.
